# Household Income and Expenditure Survey 2006/07 Summary Findings

Department of Census & Statistics Sri Lanka

#### 1. Introduction

Department of Census and Statistics (DCS) conducts the Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HIES) once in every five years. HIES 2006/07 is the sixth in the series. The objectives of this survey are to measure levels and changes in living standard of the people and to compute various socio economic indicators such as per capita consumption, per capita income, poverty indices etc. HIES 2006/07 survey questionnaire was expanded to collect more information related to poverty.

Generally HIES survey is conducted over a period of 12 monthly rounds to capture seasonal variations of income, expenditure and consumption data. Data collection of the survey was done during the period from July 2006 to June 2007 throughout the island excluding the Northern province and Trincomalee district in the Eastern province. The completed sample size was 18,544 house holds. The information contained in this report supersedes the results so far published in the preliminary publications.

#### 2. Household Income

All receipts by all the members of the household from various sources, in cash or in kind are considered as household income.

The survey results revealed that the monthly mean household income is Rs. 26,286. According to the HIES 2002 the respective figure was Rs.12,803. Hence the mean household income has doubled during last 5 years. However mean income is influenced by higher values of income. Therefore the median income is a better indicator to explain the household income.


The surve y results reveal that the median household income per month for Sri Lanka is Rs. 16,735, which means 50 percent of the total households receive less than Rs.16,735 per month.

Among the districts the highest median household income is reported from Colombo district (Rs.24,711) and the lowest median household income is reported from Nuwara Eliya district (Rs. 11,914).

## 3. Per Capita Income

Per capita mean income is estimated by dividing the estimated total income of all households in the area (sector, province, and district) by the estimated total population in the area.

According to the HIES 2006/07 in Sri Lanka, the monthly mean per capita income is reported as Rs.6,463. The survey results reveal that the highest mean per capita income is reported from Colombo district (Rs.10,165) while the lowest per capita income (Rs 4,527) is recorded from Kegalle district. (Table 2)

Survey results further reveal that the monthly per capita median income in Sri Lanka is Rs. 4,043. Which means monthly per capita income of the 50 percent of the population in Sri Lanka is below Rs. 4,043 at national level.

The monthly per capita median income in Colombo district is Rs. 5,750. This is reported as the highest value among districts. The lowest per capita median income (Rs. 2,902) is reported from Nuwara Eliya district.

#### 4. Income Receiver's Income

All persons, those who fulfill following conditions were considered as income receivers in this survey.

- I. Person's age is 10 years or more than 10 years and
- II. His / Her total income is more than or equal to Rs. 150 per month.

Survey results reveal that the income receiver's mean income per month in Sri Lanka is Rs.14,457. Further it reveals that the income receiver's mean income in Colombo district is reported as Rs. 21,355 and in Kegalle district is reported as Rs. 9,761.

## 5. Household Expenditure

Household expenditure was collected under three main sections of the survey schedule.

- (i) Expenditure on food
- (ii) Expenditure on non food
- (iii) Expenditure incurred by boarders and domestic servants.

To maintain the quality, accuracy, and reliability of data, different reference periods were imposed on above three sections, depending on the consumer behavior pattern of food items and non food items.

The survey results revealed that the mean household expenditure per month is Rs.22,952. Out of this amount food expenditure is Rs.8,641. It is 37.6 percent of the household expenditure and this proportion is defined as Food ratio.

The survey results further reveal that the highest household expenditure (Rs.37,011) is reported from Colombo district and the lowest household expenditure (Rs.13,155) is reported from Moneragala district.

# 6. Consumption of Selected Food Items.

According to the survey the mean per capita consumption of rice is reported as 9.0 kg. That indicates, a person needs 108 kg of rice per year. Per capita consumption of bread is high in urbanized districts such as Colombo, Gampaha, and Kalutara. The highest per capita consumption of Wheat flour (3.7 kg per month) is reported from Nuwara Eliya district where large number of estates are located.

# 7. Household Monthly Non - Food Expenditure

According to the survey results the average household non-food expenditure per month is Rs. 14,311. Among the items in the non - food group, the highest expenditure (Rs.2,639) is recorded on housing (percentage is given in Table 6)
