
















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Preface

This is the 44th publication of the series of National Accounts Estimates(NAE) published by the National Accounts Division of the Department of Census and Statistics (DCS). Further, this is the fourth publication which contains the NAE's based on the new base year of 2010.

In the year of 2015, the National Accounts Division of the DCS revised the base year from 2002 to 2010. In addition to revising the base year from 2002 to 2010, in the compilation of National Accounts, many other improvements were also made, such as, conceptual changes as recommended by the international guidelines (SNA 2008) and best practices, improvements in the methodology of compilation, adoption of latest classification systems, expansion of the production boundary and inclusion of emerging activities, new and recent data sources. With these improvements in the national accounting system, from 2015 second quarter onwards the DCS compiled and released the annual and quarterly estimates of National Accounts from 2010 onwards using the new base year of 2010. Accordingly, this publication is prepared based on National Accounts Estimates produced for the year 2018 with the new base year of 2010.

This publication includes tables on Production Accounts prepared according to the activities on International Standard Industrial Classification of all economic activities (ISIC Rev 4), General Government Expenditure based on the Classification of the Functions of Government (COFOG), and Private Consumption Expenditure based on Classification of Individual Consumption according to the purpose (COICOP).

Further, this publication consists of "Annual data series of GDP estimates from 2010 to 2018" in Production approach. In addition, GDP estimates compiled based on the Income and Expenditure approaches, are also included.

I hope that this publication would be benefitted for data users, including policy makers, economic planners of the country as well as for academicians, researchers and other data users, who are working for and interested in the economy of Sri Lanka.

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Chapter 1: ECONOMIC PERFORMANCE - 2018

OVERVIEW

The economic growth rate in the country for the year 2018, further grew by 3.3 percent, compared to the 3.6 percent growth reported in the previous year. The estimated annual Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at constant price (2010) for Sri Lanka for the year 2018 (January to December) reportedly reached up to Rs.9,668,600 million. In 2017, the annual GDP value at constant price (2010) was reported as Rs.9,359,147 million.

Figure 1.1 clearly shows the continuous expansion of Sri Lanka economy based on

the annual GDP estimates at constant (2010) prices, by the upward trend pattern during the period of 2011 to 2018. When look at the economic growth rate of the country in the past five years, showed an increase from 3.4 percent to 5.0 percent in 2013 to 2014 and continued as 5.0 percent in 2015. Thereafter, the economy has grown at a slower phase and the growth rates were recorded as 4.5 percent, 3.6 percent and 3.3 percent in 2016, 2017 and 2018 respectively (Figure 1.1).

With the new National Accounting frame (New Base year =2010), composition of the GDP was changed as Agriculture, Industry, Services and Taxes less subsidies on products. This is due to the adjustment of 'Taxes less subsidies on products' to the total Gross Value Added to derive Gross Domestic Product at market price. The value added of the each economic activity derived by deducting intermediate consumption from the gross

output value. Generally the, intermediate consumption is estimated at purchaser's price, the output of the economic activities is estimated at basic price. Consequently the value added is reported at basic price. In theoretical point of view, the GDP of an economy should be valued only at market price. Therefore to calculate the Gross Domestic Product at market price, the taxes should be added up to the gross value added of the total economy and then the



subsidies should be deducted. Accordingly, in the new series of national accounts, the Gross Domestic Product of the economy has

been derived by adjusting the 'taxes less subsidies on products' to the total Gross Value Added.

In the year 2018, the four major components of the economy: Agriculture, Industry, Services and Taxes less subsidies has contributed their share to the total GDP at current price (2010) by 7.9 percent, 26.6 percent, 57.1 percent and 8.4 percent respectively. The 50 percent of the economy is shouldered by the Service sector while Industrial and Agricultural sectors trailing behind. This pattern is more or less similar throughout the period of 2011-2018 (Figure 1.2).





FIGURE 1.3: ANNUAL GROWTH RATES OF AGRICULTURE, INDUSTRY, SERVICES 2014-2018

The Figure 1.3 shows the growth rates of major economic activities and the trend in annual GDP growth rates of Sri Lanka

over the last five years. In 2018, healthy expansions were recorded for most of the agricultural activities which reported an overall growth rate of 6.5 percent when compared to the slight negative growth rate of 0.4 percent recorded in 2017. The Contraction of construction activities and mining activities has slowered the growth of Industry sector and restricted to 1.2 percent growth rate compared to 4.7 percent of growth rate recorded in 2017. The Service sector grew futher by 4.6 percent in 2018. The overall GDP growth rate was reported as 3.3 percent in 2018, compared to 3.6 percent in 2017.

Contribution from the institutional sectors to the GVA

The Gross Value added (GVA) is contribution comprised by of five institutional sectors: Non-financial corporations (NFC), Financial Corporations (FC), General Government (GG), Households (HH) and Non-Profit Institutions Serving Households (NPISH). The National Accounting framework of Sri Lanka based by four categories where Households and Non-profit institutions households serving are considered together as a one sector.

When consider the Institutional Sectors contribution to the total GVA, at national level, the half of the GVA is shared by the Household and NPISH sector. (Figure 1.4). Around 35.0 percent is shared by the NFC sector. The General Government and Financial Corporation sectors shared relatively low percentages of one tenth and one twentieh of the total GVA.

When consider the Institutional Sectors contribution, to the major economic activities, (Figure 1.5) the agricultural activities has mainly driven by HH and NFC sectors. The major portion of 81.4 percent has contributed by HH sector while the rest has been contributed by the NFC sector. Sixty four percent of industrial activities has driven by the NFC sector, while 35 percent has contributed by Household /NPISH sector.

The General Government sector contribution to the Industry sector has been very low (1.7 percent). All four sectors of the economy have given their contributions to generate the gross value added of the services activities. The HH /NPISH sector contributed 51.8 percent to the total GVA of services activities while the rest have shared by the NFC, GG and FC sectors.

OUTPUT OF THE ECONOMY (MARKET OUTPUT/NON MARKET OUTPUT/ OWN USE)

Total output of the economy is comprised by Market output, Non market output and Output of own final use. The total output of year 2018 is reported as Rs. 14,948 billion at constant (2010). Out of this, 90.0 percent is represented by the market output and 6.0 percent and 4.0 percent are estimated as non-market output and own final use respectively.

FIGURE 1.6: PERCENTAGE SHARE OF OUTPUT TYPES 2018





FIGURE 1.7: OUTPUT GENERATION BY ECONOMIC ACTIVITY - 2018



The market output is mainly generated by Non Financial Corparations, Financial Corporations and major part of the Households. Private Education Private health are also considered as "Market Output". The non-market output basically comes through the General Government including Health and Education provided by the GG.The major portion of 'Output of own final use' goes to the own consumption of household's and slight portion goes the consumption of NFC's.

Total Agriculture and Industry outputs consisted with "Market Output" and "Output of own final use" only. The Service output involved with all three categories including "Non market output" also. In agricultural activities, 90 percent of the output is produced as a market output and 10.0 percent of the output is used for own consumption.

OUTPUT BY INSTITUTIONAL SECTORS

The contribution of the institutional sectors to the total output in each category of the economy is clearly showing in Figure 1.8. The market output is generated mainly through NFC, FC and HH/NPISH sectors by 46.5 percent, 4.5 percent and 49 percent respectively. Hundred percent of the output

In service activities, 85 percent produced for the market output, 11 percent produced for non-market output and 4 percent produced for own consumption. Out of this 11 percent of non market output, 8 percent is produced from the General Government.

The contribution of the institutional sectors to the total output in each category of the economy is clearly showing in Figure 1.7. The market output is generated mainly through NFC, FC and HH/NPISH sectors by 46 percent, 4 percent and 50 percent respectively. Hundred percent of the output of Financial corporations contributed to the Market output. Non market output is totally driven by the General Government sector. In 'Own final use', 98.5 percent is generated by Households and remained 1.5 percent provided by NFCs.

GDP IMPLICIT PRICE DEFLATOR

The GDP implicit price deflator which measures the price change in the economy with respect to a specific base year (2010=100), increased to 148.6 in year 2018 from 142.4 recorded in year 2017, indicating 4.3 percent of inflation rate for the year 2018.

According to the Colombo Consumer Price Index (CCPI) (2013 = 100), it has increased to 124.2 in year 2018, from 119.0 recorded in the year 2017, indicating a 4.3 percent of inflation rate.

PERFORMANCE OF MAJOR ECONOMIC ACTIVITIES IN 2018

AGRICULTURE ACTIVITIES

The year 2018 is a very favourable year for Agriculre activities and reported an expansion of 6.5 percent compared to 0.4 percent contraction reported by 2017. In 2018, the share of the 'Agriculture, forestry and fishing' has increased up- to 7.9 percent of the total GDP at current price. The highest share of 1.1 percent was reported by 'Marine fishing and marine aquaculture' activity. The main items including rice, coconut, tea, animal production, vegetables , fruits and forestry and logging have contributed by 0.7-0.9 percent to the GDP in 2018.




FIGURE 1.9: AGRICULTURE - GROWTH RATES BY ECONOMIC ACTIVITY (2018)

Annual growth rates of agricultural sub activities are shown in Figure 1.9. The sub activities of 'Growing of rice'(44.7 percent), 'Growing of other beverage crops'(25.6 percent), 'Growing of fruits'(11.4 percent) reported an outstanding growth rates when

compared to 2017. 'Animal production', 'Fresh fishing', 'Growing water oleaginous fruits including coconut', 'Growing of spices', 'Growing vegetables' have reported considerable growth rates of 8.0 percent, 7.2 percent, 7.1 percent, 5.9 percent, 4.0 percent respectively, compared to 2017. 'Growing of other cereals', 'Growing of tea' and 'Plant Propargation and Supportive services to agriculture' also have expanded by percent, 0.4 percent and 0.2 percent respectively. The activities that recorded contractions are 'Growing of rubber' (0.3 percent), 'Marine Fishing' (0.8 percent), 'Forestry and logging'(0.8 percent), 'Growing of other perennial crops' (2.5 percent) and 'Growing of sugarcane ,tobacco and other non perennial crops' (10.9 percent).

INDUSTRY ACTIVITIES

The Industry sector, is the second largest contributor of the economy which shared 26.6 percent of total GDP in 2018. The industry sector has further expanded at slower phase by 1.2 percent in 2018, compared to healthy growth rate of 4.7 percent in 2017.

Overall manufacture activities have reported an expansion of 3.6 percent in 2018. The second and third highest shareholders of the industry sector 'Manufacture of food beverages and tobacco products' and 'Manufacture of textiles, wearing apparals and leather products'have showed considerable expansions of 4.0 percent and 3.4 percent respectively in 2018. The sub activities of 'Manufacture of Other non metallic mineral products' and 'Manufacture of Basic metals and fabricated metals' have expanded strikingly further by 9.3 percent and 9.7 percent respectively.




FIGURE 1.10: INDUSTRY - GROWTH RATES OF ECONOMIC ACTIVITY FOR 2018

The 'Construction' activity, which is the highest shareholder of industry sector shared 7.3 percent of GDP in 2018 recorded a considerable contraction of 2.5percent along with 'Mining and quarrying' activitiy which reported a contraction by 5.2 percent. In 2017 both these activities recorded substantial growth rates of 4.4 percent and 9.3 percent respectively.

Similar to 2017, in 2018 also, 'Manufacture of coke and refined petroleum' reported the highest contraction in industrial activities which recorded a contraction by 8.2 percent.

The 'Electricity' and 'Water collection and treatments' activities showed further increases by 5.9 percent, 5.8 percent respectively in 2018 compared to 2017.

SERVICES ACTIVITIES

The Service activity, which shared more than 50 percent of GDP, has healthily expanded by 4.6 percent in 2018 compared to the year 2017 which recorded an expansion of 3.6 percent.

The 'Wholesale retail trade' and ,'Transportation of goods and passengers including ware houses' and 'Other Personal services' have shared 10.7 percent, 11.4 percent and 9.6 percent of GDP have recorded further expansions of 4.7 percent, 2.1 percent and 2.7 percent respectively in 2018 compared to 2017. The 'Wholesale and retail trade' is one of the largest economic activity which generated a considerable amount of value addition to the economy, has expanded continuously over the last few years. The wholesale and retail trade activity considers the valued addition created through the domestic trading activities.

According to the Balance of Payment Statistics of Central Bank of Sri Lanka, the annual total import expenditure for the year 2018 has increased up to to Rs. 3,606,643.7 million from Rs 3,198,572.2 million recorded

in year 2017, indicating an increase of 12.8 percent annual growth. According to the trade indices, the import volume index of consumer goods has increased by 9.6 percent, during the year 2018. In addition, the total trading output value of Agriculture, forestry and fishing activity has increased by 5.9 percent in year 2018 when compared to the year 2017. The total trading output value of Industrial activities has

increased up to Rs. 904,416 million in year 2018 from Rs.835,875 million in year 2017 indicating an increase of 8.2 percent.

Outstanding growth rates of 17.3 percent, 13.4 percent, 11.1 percent and 10.4 percent were recorded for 'Insurance, reinsurance and pension fundings', 'Financial service activities', 'IT programmingconsutancy and related activities' and 'Telecommunication 'services' in 2018 compared to 2017.




FIGURE 1.11: SERVICES - GROWTH RATES OF ECONOMIC ACTIVITY FOR 2018

'Accommodation and food and beverage serving' activity grew by 5.7 percent in this year compared to 2017. 'Real estate activities', 'Professional services', 'Education' and 'Health' also have expanded favourably in 2018 compared to 2017

Only two activities has reported contractions in the service sector in 2018 compared to the previous year of 2017, the service of 'programming and broadcasting by 10.2 percent and 'public administration' by 0.6 percent.

Chapter 2: Detailed Review of Economic Activities

In this chapter the performances of economic activities in Agriculture, Industry and Service sectors in year 2018 are broadly discussed. Mostly, they are compared with 2017 annual data. In many data tables the base year (2010) values are also included for the reference.

Overall Agricultural activities has added Rs 683,816 million to the Sri Lankan Economy in 2018, reporting expansion of 6.5 percent compared to the contraction of 0.4 percent recorded in 2017. The expansion of several agricultural activities in year 2018 has been the main reason for this expansion .

Among them, the sub activity of 'Growing of rice' has increased substantially by 44.7 percent during the year 2018 compared to 7.1 percent decreased reported in 2017. 'Growing of oleaginous fruits, including coconut' has reported an expansion by 7.1 percent in 2018, favorable weather condition thruought the coconut growing areas caused for this increase.. Also Growing of fruits, 'Growing of other beverage crops' have increased by 11.4 percent, 25.6 percent respectively in 2018. 'Animal production', 'Growing water fishing', vegetable' have increased by 8.0 percent, 7.2 percent' 4.0 percent. But several major agriculture activities reported moderate increased in year 2018. Growing of Tea has increased by 0.4 percent compared to 4.5 percent increase in 2017.

Meanwhile several major agriculture activities have shown contractions in 2018 compared to 2017. 'Growing of rubber', 'Forestry and logging', 'marine fishing and marine aquaculture' declined 0.3 percent, 0.8 percent and 0.8 percent respectively in 2018

compared to 2017. The growth rates of 'Growing of other non perennial crops including sugar cane and tobacco', Growing of other perennial crops have declined substantially by 10.9 percent, 2.5 percent respectively in year 2018.

Ninety percent of the total output of Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing sector is produced for the market and 10 percent is used the 'own use'. Only 'Growing of rice', 'Growing of coconut' activities reported 20 percent of the output used for own use, and 'Forestry and logging' activity reported more than 30 percent. Generally 80 percent of the gross value added of agricultural activities comes through the household sector. However 35 percent and 60 percent of value additions of 'Growing of tea' and 'Animal production' come through the NFCs.

The industrial activities have expanded further by 1.2 percent in 2018 compared to 2017. The total contribution of Industry activities to the GDP is recorded as Rs. 2,54,0315 million. During the year of 2018, the manufacturing activities alone has contributed Rs.1,512,800 million to the total GDP, indicating a growth of 3.6 percent compared to 2017.

Among the manufacturing activities, 'Manufacture of basic metal and fabricated metal products' 'Manufacture of other non metallic mineral products' reported an outstanding growth rates of 9.7 percent, 9.3 percent respectively.

Also, 'Manufacture of food, beverages and tobacco products' which is the highest contributor of manufacturing sector, has recorded an expansion of 4.0 percent in year

2018. Similarly 'Manufacture of textile, apparel and leather wearing relat', 'Manufacture of chemical products and pharmaceutical basic products', 'Manufacture of wood and of products of wood' showed expansion of 3.4 percent, 3.4 percent and 2.8 percent respectively compared to the growth rates of 5.2 percent and 3.8 percent and 0.2 respectively recorded in 2017. However, Manufacture of coke and refined petroleum products' has recorded a contraction of 8.2 percent in year 2018.

The 'Construction' activity, the highest shareholder of industrial activities, has declined by 2.5 percent in 2018 The sub activity of 'Mining and quarrying' also has declined by 5.2 percent in 2018 compared to the high growth rates of 4.4 percent, 9.3 percent recorded in 2017.

The value added of 'Electricity', 'Water collection, treatment and supply' and 'Sewerage, waste, treatment and disposal activities' also have expanded by 5.9 percent, 5.8 percent and 6.7 percent respectively over the period of 2018.

PERFORMANCE OF AGRICULTURAL ACTIVITIES

GROWING OF CEREALS

In year 2018, the activity of "Growing of Cereals" has contributed Rs. 11,736 million to the gross domestic product at constant (2010) market prices of the country. Production of 'Maize' contributed the highest proportions of 81% out of the total cereal production. The growth rate of this

The service activities have contributed Rs. 5,555,303 million to the total GDP in 2018. All the service activities except 'Programming and broadcasting activities, 'Public administration and defense' have expanded during 2018 which make an overall increase of 4.6 percent when compared to the year 2017.


The outstanding performances were reported by 'Insurance', 'Financial service activities', 'IT programming consultancy and related activities, 'Telecommunication' which grew by 17.3 percent 13.4 percent, 11.1 percent and 10.4 percent respectively in 2018 when compared to 2017. The other main activities underpinned the service sector are 'Accommodation', 'Professional services' Education, 'Real estate' which reported significant growth rates of 5.7 percent, 4.3 percent, 4.0 percent, 3.9 percent respectively compared to previous year. The highest contributors to the service sector, the 'Whole sale and retail trade' 'Transportation of goods and passengers warehouses' including have recorded expansions of 4.7 percent and 2.1 percent respectively.

activity showed a heavy decline by 12.6 percent in 2017, but it has increased by 2.0 percent in 2018. Percentage change in GDP implicit price deflator which indicates the impact of price effect on the activity has also reported a 10.4 representing a significant increase of prices in 2018.

GROWING OF RICE

Rice is the staple food in the country. It's a non-perennial crop, growing in all districts of the country. Rice is regarding as a seasonal crop based on North-East and South-West monsoon rains. The share of 'Growing of rice' has been increased to 0.9

percent to the total GDP in 2018. The value added of 'Growing of Rice' has reported an increase of 44.7 percent in the year 2018 compared to 7.1 percent decrease reported in 2017 (Table 2.2).



Figure 2.2 shows the comparison of paddy production by province in 2017 and 2018. North-Western and North- Central provinces reported an expansion of 164

percent and 66 percent of paddy production in 2018 compared to 2017. The highest paddy production in 2018 is reported from the North-Central Province of Sri Lanka.

GROWING OF VEGETABLES

The gross value added of 'Growing of vegetables' contributed 0.7 percent of the GDP in 2018. The gross value added of growing of vegetable recorded a 4.0 percent increase in 2018 compared to 5.3 percent decrease reported in 2017. This activity added Rs. 57,439 million to the total GDP in real terms in 2018 (Table 2.3).

According to the quantity produced in 2018, the five main vegetable items reported were Manioc, Green leaves (mugunuwenna and gotukola collectively), Brinjals, Cabbage and Red pumpking.

GROWING OF OLEAGINOUS FRUITS


The activity of "Growing of oleaginous fruits" mainly consists of growing of coconut. The gross value added to the GDP in this activity increased from Rs.53,773 million reported in 2017 to Rs.57,577 million in 2018, recording a increase of 7.1 percent. The percentage share of this activity to the GDP in 2018 remained at 0.8 percent compared to 2017

(Table 2.4). Total coconut production of the country has gradually increased from the first quarter to the fourth quarter of 2018 and reported an incline of 173,570 thousand nuts in year 2018, compared to year 2017. The favorable weather conditions prevailed throughout the coconut growing areas has become the main factor contributed for this increase.

GROWING OF TEA

The growth rate of 'Growing of Tea' has increased by 0.4 percent in year 2018 compared to 2017. The favorable weather conditions prevailed throughout the tea growing areas was the main reason for this increase. The gross value added at

constant (2010) market prices was estimated as Rs. 67,141 million in 2018. GDP implicit price deflator showed a 7.4 percent decrease compared to 2017 (Table 2.5).

FIGURE 2.4: ANNUAL TEA PRODUCTION AND PRICES (2010 -2018)





Figure 2.4 shows that the average tea price of one kilogram of Tea at Colombo Tea Auction in 2018 has decreased to Rs.580.71 from Rs. Rs.617.17 as reported in 2017 indicating 5.9 percent price decrease in 2018. In 2018, only 282 million kilograms of tea has been exported and it was registered as a decrease of 2.3 percent. In year 2018 except

Western and Central provinces, Southern, Uva and Sabaragamuwa provinces reported a decrease in tea leaves production (Figure 2.5). Central province which is the main tea producing province in Sri Lanka, reported 4.6 percent increase in 2018 compared to 2017.

GROWING OF RUBBER

In year 2018, the activity of 'Growing of Rubber' has contributed Rs. 24,085 million to the gross domestic product of the country, which denote a decrease of 0.3 percent compared to the year 2017. According to Table 2.6 percentage change

in GDP implicit price deflator has reported a positive value of 14.5 in 2018. The contribution to the GDP by this activity has lowered from 0.7 percent in 2010 to 0.2 percent in 2018.

Figure 2.6 shows the changes in production and prices of Rubber in the country from 2010-2018. It clearly depicts the gradual contraction of production and the prices within 2010-2016. In 2018 the rubber production of the country recorded

a slight decrease by 0.6 percent and prices reported an increased by 2.4 percent locally. In 2018 the average price for one kilogram of rubber at the global market reported an increase by 5.9 percent compared to the year 2018.




FIGURE 2.7: COMPARISON OF RUBBER PRODUCTION BY PROVINCE (2017 AND 2018)

Rubber grows in seven provinces out of nine in Sri Lanka and 'Sabaragamuwa' is the main province trailed by Western province. The rubber production in Sabaragamuwa province reported a decrease by 1.2 percent in 2018 compared to 2017.(Figure 2.7)

GROWING OF OTHER PERENNIAL CROPS

The 'Growing of other perennial crops' shrank by 2.5 percent during 2018 compared to 2017, contributing Rs.16,303 million to the total GDP at constant market price compared to the recorded value added of Rs.16,717 million in 2017 (Table 2.7). This activity consisted with six main perennial crops: 'Growing of betel', 'Growing of areca-nut', 'Raising of palmyra tubers from seeds', 'Toddy tapping', 'Growing of jak fruit, and

'Growing of bread fruit'. All these activities belonged to household sector and 98% of them produce for the market.



The composition of the sub activities to the current value added of 2018 was given in Figure 2.8. Out of these six sub categories, the highest contribution of 49 percent was provided from toddy tapping activity. Toddy tapping activity included three sub categories as coconut toddy, civil toddy and Palmyra toddy tapping. Even though the coconut production has reported an expansion, the coconut toddy production has decreased by 22 percent in 2018, compared to 2017.

The weather conditions prevailed in 2018, slightly affected on some perennial crops especially jak fruit and bread fruit productions. The betel production has expanded by 3.4 percent in 2018 compared to 2017. The main reason reported is, the satisfactory climatic conditions prevailed in Kurunegala, Gampaha, Kegalle and Kaluthara districts. The average price for thousand leaves of betel has increased by 5 percent compared to year 2017. Figure 2.9 indicates the changes in Production and prices in betel from 2010 to 2018.

ANIMAL PRODUCTION

The activity of "Animal Production" comprises with three sub sections viz. Rearing animals for meat, Milk production and Eggs production. Rearing animals covered cattle, goats, swine and poultry farming. In 2018, the animal production

activity further grew by 8.0 percent in real terms compared to the year 2017 and added Rs. 63,418 million to the total GDP, representing a share of 0.9 percent at current market price (Table 2.8).

Table 2.9 shows the producer prices of each item in 2010, 2017 and 2018 and the price change between 2017 and 2018. Price of a cow has increased by Rs.32,868 from 2010 to 2018. The price change of a cow between the two consecutive years, 2017 and 2018 is around 24 percent. In 2018, the average price change of an egg has increased by 13.7 percent compared to year 2017. The producer price of one liter of milk in 2010 has almost doubled in 2018. The pattern of milk production and eggs production of the country in the period of 2010-2018 is given in Figure 2.10 .These two industries have shown a gradual increase within the period of 2010-2018. When compared to 2017, in year 2018 milk production of the country has expanded by 19.03 percent.





FIGURE 2.11: SHARE OF SUB ACTIVITIES OF ANIMAL PRODUCTION TO THE GDP IN 2018

Figure 2.11 shows the share of sub activities of 'Animal Production' in 2018. Almost fifty percent of the current value added of this activity is shouldered by poultry industry. Poultry industry reported an increase of 6.6 percent during 2018 when compared to 2017. interesting to note that cattle slaughtering has reduced by 5.7 percent during the period of 2017-2018. Milk and Eggs production together shoulder 33 percent of the value added of animal production activity (Figure 2.11)

FIGURE 2.10: MILK AND EGGS PRODUCTION (2010-2018)

PLANT PROPAGATION AND SUPPORT **SERVICES TO THE AGRICULTURE**

The activity of 'Plant propagation' and activity of 'Support services to the agriculture' jointly added Rs.13,963 million and Rs.9,258 million to the GDP in nominal and real terms respectively in year 2017 (Table 2.10). Both these activities together reported a slight increase of 0.2 percent in 2018 compared to 2017. The activity of "Plant propagation" mainly includes the sapling production of Coconut, Rubber, Tea, Fruits, Flowers and main Minor Export Crops: Cinnamon and Pepper that used for propagation activities

in the country. Large amount of plant saplings were produced from respective government nurseries have been used for many government projects. Compared to year 2017, the bad weather conditions prevailed throughout the adversely affected the production of plant saplings of all items in 2018. Agriculture support services consist with many sub activities and the support service of coconut plucking has reported substantial increase by 21 percent in 2018 compared to year 2017.

In 2018, the gross value added of "Forestry and Logging" activity at real terms was estimated as Rs. 62,020 million to the total GDP.



decrease of 0.84 percent compared to 19.2 percent increase recorded in 2017 (Table 2.11).

Annual log production of State Timber Corporation usually remained within the range of 100,000- 150,000 cubic meters during the period of 2010-2018. Based on

this value, the estimated total timber production of the country is 2,414,492 cubic meters in 2018 (Figure 2.12).

MARINE AND FRESH WATER FISHING AND AQUACULTURE


Marine Fishing comprised 85 percent of total fishing industry in the country. The value addition of the marine fishery activity reported as Rs.102,175 million in real terms to the total Gross Domestic Product in the year 2018, showed a slight decrease of 0.8 percent when compared to year 2017 (Table 2.12). This activity mainly comprised with two sub items, "Off shore Fishing" and "Coastal water fishing". The

60 percent of total marine fish production comes through the coastal fishery production which is usually operated by using motor boats, canoes and the pram etc. In year 2018 coastal fish production has decreased by 4.1 percent compared to year 2017 and the deep sea fish production has increased slightly by 0.3 percent (Figure 2.13).

"Inland fishing and inland aquaculture" activity has increased by 7.2 percent in year 2018. According to the reports of Ministry of Fisheries and Aquatic

Resources Development, the dry weather conditions prevailed in tank areas in 2018, has supported to get the high catchment of fish from inland fishery tanks.

PERFORMANCE OF INDUSTRY ACTIVITIES

A one third of the Sri Lankan economy was completed by the industry sector. These industry activities comprised with 'Manufacturing activities' the principal shareholder of industry sharing 59.5 percent along with 'Construction', 'Mining and quarrying', 'Electricity and related activities' and 'water and sewerage collection, treatment and supply'. Industry activities altogether grew at slower pace of 1.2 percent in 2018 and added Rs. 2,540,315 million to the gross domestic product in real terms. The share to the GDP in 2018 was reported as 26.6 percent.

When considering the sector wise performances, Non-financial corporations were the main performer in industry sector, which grew by 7.7 percent in 2018. Government sector grew by 15.9 percent in 2018 when compared to 2017. The highest share of 63.7 percent of industry is hold by NFCs' while 'Households and NPISH' together shared 34.6 percent. The remaining 1.7 percent was shared by the government sector. The Lion's share of the output of the industries is produced for market 96.9 percent and only residual 3.1 percent produced for own use in 2018.

FIGURE 2.15 : INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR WISE PROPORTION IN INDUSTRY 2018





FIGURE 2.16: OUTPUT BY TYPE IN INDUSTRY 2018



MINING AND QUARRYING

Mining and quarrying sector consist with three main sub activities "Quarrying of stone/granite, sand and clay", "Mining of Gems" and "Other mining and quarrying not elsewhere classified". The GDP contribution was Rs.225,505 million in year 2018 and when compared to year 2017, a negative growth of 5.2 percent was recorded in real terms.

"Quarrying of stone/granite, sand/sea sand and clay" contains mainly construction material is the major sub sector which covered the 90 percent of the total output of "Mining and Quarrying" activity. The value added of this activity was estimated indirectly, based on cement availability of country, recorded negative growth of 5.5 percent in year 2018 compared to year 2017. The slowdown of the construction industry has affected to this decline.

The sub sector of Minerals which includes phosphate, graphite, salt, gypsum, lime stone, rutile, ilmenite, zircon, hi ilmenite etc. Altogether was recorded a growth of 0.8 percent in year 2018.

Mining of Gems" perform a prominent role in earning foreign exchange to the


country, reported a 2.8 decrease in export earnings in 2018 compared to 2017. Which includes eleven of "high expensive gem verities" (blue, pink, star, white and yellow sapphires, pathmaraga,

MANUFACTURING INDUSTRY

Manufacturing industry sector comprises with 24 ISIC categories. Data was collected by "Quarterly Survey of Industries" and "Annual Survey of Industry. The dissemination categories were "Manufacture of Food, beverages & Tobacco products", "Manufacture of Textiles, wearing apparel and leather related products", "Manufacture of Wood and products of wood and cork, except furniture", "Manufacture of Paper products, printing and reproduction of

media products", "Manufacture of Coke and refined petroleum products", "Manufacture of Chemical products and basic pharmaceutical products", "Manufacture of Rubber and plastic products", "Manufacture of Other nonmetallic mineral products", "Manufacture of Basic metals and fabricated metal products", "Manufacture of Machinery and equipment etc.", "Manufacture of Furniture, Other manufacturing,

Repair and installation of machinery and equipment".


The major economic indicators are shown in Table 2.16. The share of these activities to the total GDP was reported as 15.8 percent in year 2018. The overall Manufacturing industry sector contributed Rs 1,512,800 millions of value addition at real terms to the total GDP in 2018. It indicated a 3.6 percent growth in

2018 compared to 4.2 percent growth in 2017. The major manufacturing category of Manufacture of Food, beverages & Tobacco products, reported 1.0 growth rate in 2017 it further grew 4.0 percent in 2018. The sub sector of manufacture of textiles, wearing apparel and leather related products, reported 5.2 percent growth rate in 2017. It further grew 3.4 percent in 2018.


The shares of the activities to the total value added in manufacturing sector were shown in Figure 2.18. When compared to the 2017, the sub activity of "Manufacture"

of paper products, printing and reproduction" further grew by 1.1 percent in 2018 from 5.3 percent. "Manufacture of chemical products and basic

pharmaceutical products" showed a positive growth of 3.4 percent in 2018 in comparison to the growth of 3.8 percent reported in 2017. "Manufacture of basic

metals and fabricated metal product" grew by 9.7 percent in 2018 compared to high growth rate of 13.7 percent reported in 2017.

When compared with year 2017, the sub activity of "Manufacture of other non-metallic minerals products" further expanded by 9.3 percent in year 2018. In year 2017, this activity reported as 11.7 percent high growth rate.

""Manufacture of rubber and plastic products" has increased in 2.3 percent in

year 2018, compared to 11.9 percent increase reported in 2017. The sub activity of "Manufacture of coke and refined petroleum product reported negative performance in year 2017 and 2018. All other sub activities of the manufacturing category contributed positively to the overall growth.

ELECTRICITY

Electricity, generation, transmission and distribution activity further grew by 5.9 percent in year 2018 along with 2.6 percent

This growth in GVA was clearly reflected by the generation increase which reported as growth reported in year 2017. The share of this activity to the total GDP was reported as 0.7 percent in year 2018.

2.9 percent in 2017 and 3.9 percent in 2018 (Table 2.17)The total electricity generation of

the country increased to 15,255 GWH in 2018 from 14,671 GWH in 2017. CEB contributed 77.4 per cent to the total power

generation in 2018, while the remainder was purchased from the independent power producers (IPPs).



The existed ratio of 31:69 hydro and thermal power generation in the year 2017 has changed 42:58 in this year. The fuel and coal based power generation has grown by 6.7 percent in 2017. The hydro power generation reported significant growth by 3.9 percent in

2018.() Electricity sales grew by 5 percent during the year. The increase in electricity sales was mainly driven by the domestic and religious category.

CONSTRUCTION

The second largest activity of the industry sector, "Construction" has shared 7.3 percent of total gross domestic product of the country in year 2018. It has reported negative growth rate of 2.5 percent in real terms in 2018. In nominal terms the gross value added of construction industry has increased by 0.9 percent. Construction activities included the construction of buildings, highways, bridges, water supply and drainage systems, irrigation and land,

dredging and reclamation and other activities regarding construction. The total cement availability of the country diclined by 6.3 in 2018. Local cement production grew by 0.9 percent while cement imports has dicreased by 9.9 percent.

ACTIVTIES


The Service sector was the key benefactor of the economy, sharing 57.1 percent of the total GDP, grew by 4.6 percent in the year 2018. Fifteen major sectors from section G to section U which contain 55 sub-groups under ISIC classification revision 4.0 were formally amalgamate together and

disseminated under 15 service activity groups in the GDP production account in the new series. The total value added of service sector was reported as Rs. 8,207,045 and Rs. 5,555,303 million at nominal and real terms respectively in year 2018.


FIGURE 2.22: SHARE OF MAIN SERVICES ACTIVITIES TO THE TOTAL GVA OF SERVICE SECTOR 2018



The "Transportations of goods and services including warehousing" comprises the highest share of 20 percent of total gross value added generated by service sector trailed with "wholesale and retail trade" services with 19 percent and "Other personal services activities" with 17 percent (Figure 2.22). The other main components were "public administration and defense;

compulsory social security" "real estate activities including ownership of dwelling" and "financial services and auxiliary service activities" which encompasses of 11 percent, 10 percent and 7 percent respectively. All other service activities collectively share 16 percent of gross value added of service sector in nominal terms in year 2018.

FIGURE 2.23: SECTORIAL SHARE IN SERVICE SECTOR, 2018




The institutional sector breakdown in service sector showed that 52 percent of value added generated from household/NPISH (Figure 2.23) in year 2018. 24 percent of the GVA generated by services sector, is shared by the NFC sector.

The gross value added generated by financial institutions grown by 14.0 percent in year 2018, compared to the 8.6 percent of growth recorded in the year 2017 (

Figure **2.24**).

WHOLESALE AND RETAIL TRADE

The wholesale and retail trade which contributes nearly 10.7 percent to the overall GDP, grew by 4.7 percent in the year 2018. It's one of the largest economic activity which generate a considerable amount of value addition to the economy, has expanded continuously over the last few years.

The wholesale and retail trade activity considers the valued addition created through the domestic trading activities. Domestic trading activity is consisted by the imported goods and domestically produced goods. The value addition is generated through the trading of these goods domestically. The value added of wholesale and retail trade activity is affected by fluctuations in total imports and total domestic production. Therefore the growth rate of this activity is depended on the variations in the three variables Imports, Agricultural production and Industrial production.

According to the Balance of Payment Statistics of Central Bank of Sri Lanka, the annual total import expenditure for the year 2018 has increased up to Rs. million

3,606,643 from Rs. million 3,198,572 recorded in the year 2017, indicating an increase of 12.8 percent in annual total import expenditure. According to the trade indices, the import volume index of consumer goods has increased by 9.6 percent, during the year 2018. However, among the consumer goods, import volume indices of these categories namely spices, sugar and confectionary items, vehicles and non-food consumables have increased remarkably while cereals and milling industry products and clothing & accessories have decreased substantially during this period, when compared with the year 2018. Increase in the imported consumer goods may have direct impact on domestic trading activities.

In addition, the total trading Output value of Agriculture, forestry and fishing activity has increased by 5.9 percent in the year of 2018 when compared with the year 2017. The total trading output value of industrial activities has increased up to Rs. Mn. 904,416 from Rs. Mn. 835,875 in the year 2018 indicating an increase of 8.2 percent.

Accordingly, wholesale and retail trade activity generated Rs. Mn. 1,040,360 worth of gross value added at constant price to the economy in the year 2018. It contributed to

the overall GDP by 10.7 percent and when compared with the previous year, the GVA of this activity grew by 4.7 percent.

TRANSPORTATION AND STORAGE

Transportation and storage activity has expanded by 2.1 percent in 2018 compared to the 3.2 percent growth reported in 2017 adding Rs.1,034,755 million to the gross domestic product of the country in real terms. The share was stated as 11.4 in 2018.

The number of new registration of buses showed 11.2 percent decrease in year 2018. Registration of lorries decreased by 18.0 percent. New registration of motor cars displayed a positive growth rate of 106.2 percent in year 2018. Threewheeler registrations also reported a 20.0 percent decrease within the 2018. (Figure 2.25).

The public transport mainly comprise with railway, SLTB and private buses and three wheelers. The passenger kilometers operated by Sri Lanka Railway and Sri Lanka Transport Board decreaced by 4.0 percent and 1.2 percent respectively during the year 2018. A 0.9 percent decrease was reported for daily operated SLTB buses in year 2018.

The passenger kilometers operated by Sri Lankan airways increased by 14.5 percent in year 2018, against the 8.6 percent increase reported in year 2017.

FIGURE 2.25: PERCENTAGE CHANGE OF VEHICLE REGISTRATION, 2018





FIGURE 2.26: PERCENTAGE FREIGHT HANDLING BY PORTS 2018



The cargo handling was mainly operated by five commercial ports: Colombo, Trincomalee, Galle, Hambantota, Kankasanthurei and the total number of ships arrived to these ports were dropped from 4,942 in 2017 to 4,933 in 2018, denoting 0.2 percent decrease. The total cargo handled by these ports was expanded by 11.8 percent in year 2018. Colombo the premier port handled 95 percent of total

cargo (Figure 2.26). Meanwhile the transshipment containers (Twenty Foot Equivalent Units-TEUs '000) expanded from 4,742 in year 2017 to 5,602 in year 2018 indicating 18.2 percent increase throughout the period. Further, freight ton transported by Sri-Lanka Railway showed a decreased of 8.0 percent. The freight tons kilometers flown by Sri Lankan Air lines by 13.4 percent in year 2018, compared to year 2017.

ACCOMMODATION, FOOD AND BEVERAGE SERVING ACTIVITIES

Under the new National Accounting framework (Base year, 2010) this activity is compiled considering two main economic activities. According to the International Standard of Industrial classification Revision 4, this industry is identified as two major economic activities. One is Accommodation activities and the other one is food and beverage service activities. However, in the compilation process, these were compiled as one category due to insufficient data sources related to domestic food and beverage activities. The Output serving Accommodation, food and beverage serving activity is estimated based on the Output related data of quarterly and annual value added tax, which is provided by the Department of Inland Revenue, related to

this economic activity. In addition, some important indicators related to the tourism industry in Sri Lanka, like room occupancy rate in tourist hotels, total of foreign and local guest nights, monthly and annual tourist arrivals, total number of tourists hotel units, total supply of supplementary accommodation units and accommodation capacity which are provided by the Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority, are also being considered.


The Accommodation, food and beverage serving activity altogether contributed to the economy Rs. 154,794 Million worth of gross value added at constant price, during the year 2018. It is 4.6 percent of growth, when compared with the previous year. The

estimated output of this industry has expanded over the past six years.

When observe the performance of the other leading indicators in tourism industry the number of international tourist arrivals, in the year 2018, has recorded significant increase by 10.3 percent, when compared to the tourist arrivals of year 2017, with showing impressive growth trends in the whole industry. However, the room occupancy rate calculated related to the graded hotels, motels and guest houses which are registered members under the Sri

Lanka Tourism Development Authority, have decreased slightly up to 72.8 in the year 2018, from 73.3 recorded in 2017. In addition, total foreign guest nights and local guest nights recorded at all tourist's hotel have been grown substantially by percent and 10.0 percent respectively during the year 2018, when compared with the year 2017. During this period, room capacity of tourist hotels and supplementary accommodation units have also been increased remarkably, recording 4.5 percent and 7.6 percent growth rates respectively.

TELECOMMUNICATION

The telecommunication industry significantly grew by 10.4 percent in 2018, beside 12.2 percent growth reported in 2017. The total values added to the GDP in

nominal and real terms were Rs76,271 million and Rs. 45,830 million, respectively. The share to GDP was reported as 0.5 percent.

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


FIGURE 2.28 : PERCENTAGE INCREASE IN INTERNET, MOBILE AND FIXED CONNECTIONS (2011-2018)




FIGURE 2.29: PERCENTAGE CHANGE IN TELEPHONE USAGE 2018/2017

Telecommunication activity experiences a relatively high growth in the past four years. The total telephone penetration has almost clocked the 30 million milestones. The demand generated mainly through cellular mobiles where the proportion of fixed phones to cellular mobiles were reported as 07:93 in year 2018. The use of cellular mobile

phones in 2018 has increased by 15.3 percent, while fixed access telephones has decreased 4.5 percent compared to year 2017 (Figure 2.29). The internet and email subscribers are continually increasing from 0.5 million in 2010 to approximately 10 million in 2018 while registering 78.9 percent growth in 2018.

IT PROGRAMMING CONSULTANCY AND RELATED ACTIVITIES

Information and communication industry is one of the most emerging industry in Sri Lanka. Over the last decade, it has made significant progress in the industry. The export revenue earned, total employment engaged and the number of companies in the industry have been grown remarkably during the past decade. In addition, in the

recent past, the global ranking position for Sri Lanka too has improved significantly.

With compilation procedures and expansion process, undertaken at the national accounts rebasing project (Base year, 2010), new compilation categories were introduced. IT programming consultancy and related activities was a

key compilation category among the newly introduced compilation categories to the system.

According to the ISIC Rev.4, this industry mainly covers two broader areas of Information Technology/Business Process Management(IT/BPM) industry. ISIC code 62 constitutes all the activities related to computer programming and consultancy related activities. **ISIC** 63 covers information services activities. activity Accordingly, this mainly constitute by computer programming computer consultancy activities, computer facilities management activities,

other information technology and computer service activities, data processing, hosting and related activities and web portals. Based on Value Added Tax data provided by the Department of Inland Revenue, related to IT/BPM industry in Sri Lanka, the national level total output was estimated.

Accordingly estimated output for the year 2018 was Rs. Mn. 28,928 at nominal term. The generated value added for this industry increased up to Rs. Mn. 15,072 in the year 2018, from Rs. Mn. 13,564, resulting a positive growth rate of 11.1 percent.

FINANCIAL SERVICES AND AUXILIARY FINANCIAL SERVICES

Financial and auxiliary financial activities showed a significant growth of 13.4 percent in the year 2018 compared to 9.4 percent growth reported for the year 2017. The generated gross value added at real terms was recorded as Rs.687,918 million.

The banking sector is the most important sub sector in this activity, consisted with 26 Licensed Commercial Banks, including 13 domestic and 13 foreign banks and 7 licensed specialized banks.

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

Total number of bank branches and other outlets operative throughout the island were reported a increse and recorded as 6882 for the year 2018. The automated

teller machine services have expanded virtually by 601 new machines by year 2018.

The assets of the banking sector has reported 14.6 percent expansion over the past year reaching 10.4 trillion in year 2018 compared to 9.0 trillion recorded for year 2017 (Figure 2.30). Eighty four percent of the assets comprises with Gross loans and advances which extended to all major activities in the economy covering agriculture and fisheries, manufacturing, construction and trade services, extended by 19.6 percent in year 2018 compared to year 2017. Investment

which accounted for 22.7 percent of total assets grew by 14.6 percent during the year 2018. Total borrowings recorded a 15.0 percent growth during year 2018. When considering bank deposits, which consist mainly with time deposits, saving deposits and demand deposits, grew by 14.5 percent in year 2018. The 6.8 percent growth rate was reported by saving deposits and 9.7 percent growth reported by demand deposits.

INSURANCE AND PENSION FUNDING

Insurance and pension funding activity grew by 17.3 percent in the 2018 compared to 4.1 percent growth recorded in the 2017. The value added generated by this activity in nominal and real terms were Rs. 157,591 million and Rs.112,493 million respectively during the 2018.

This activity comprises with local and foreign insurance companies and pension funding boards. Consequently twenty three local insurance companies, four foreign companies, Employee's Provident Fund and


Employees Trust Fund were belong to this activity in 2018.

The premium earned and claims incurred in insurance activity grew by 17.6 percent and 45.9 percent respectively in year 2018 compared to 2017. The gross output of this industry mainly based on the difference between premiums earned and claims paid. The investment income and the other income generated by insurance companies were also accounted for the gross output.

REAL ESTATE ACTIVITIES INCLUDING OWNERSHIP OF DWELLINGS

The activity of "Real estate activities including ownership of dwellings" indicates a positive growing from year 2017 to year 2018. During the year 2018, it has expanded by 3.9percent compared to

the expansion of 4.7 percent reported in year 2017. This activity has added Rs.834,398 million and Rs.566,078 million at nominal and in real terms respectively to the total GDP, Table 3.26. The

ownership of dwellings was estimated using average monthly housing rent. The average monthly housing rent in urban, rural and estate sectors were increased during the year 2018. The highest increase reported from estate sector by 9.1 percent. On an average the housing rent of Sri


Lanka has increased by 6.1 percent in year 2018. (

Figure 2.32) The share of sub activities of real estate and ownership of dwellings to the activity of 'real estate' was reported as 50.2 percent and 49.8 percent respectively.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

Professional services are another new compilation category introduced to the national accounting system under the rebasing project (Base year 2010). The sub activity of 'Professional service' is a combination of eight compilation categories. It is mainly comprised by 'Legal and accounting activities', 'Architectural and engineering activities', 'Scientific research

and development', 'advertising and market research, other professional, scientific and technical activities and publishing activities', 'Veterinary activities', 'Rental and leasing activities', 'Employment, travel agency, security and investigation activities' and 'Services to building and landscape activities'. Professional services consider the value addition generated through all these

economic activities. The total output values of these economic activities are estimated based on the value added tax national level data released by the Department of Inland Revenue.

All these economic activities which are coming under professional services

contributed to the overall GDP averagely by 1.7 percent. Accordingly, the reported gross value added for the year 2018 was Rs. Mn. 165,550. It has increased by 4.3 percent when compared the GVA generated in the year 2017.

OTHER PERSONAL SERVICES

The Other personal services activity is one of a largest sub sector among service industry activities and has grown by 2.7 percent during the year 2018. The sub activity of 'Other personal service activities' which is also a combination of two compilation categories' and is comprised by 'Arts entertainment and other recreation activities' and 'other personal service activities' mainly. These activities are mainly constituting by creative, entertainment activities, gambling, betting, sports activities and recreation activities, repair of computers and personal household goods, washing, dry cleaning, hair dressing, other beauty treatment, funeral related activities and other personal service activities.

The output value of this activity was also estimated by using the national level value added tax data released by the Department of Inland Revenue. The other personal services, all together contributed nearly 9.6 percent to the overall GDP and in past few years it has expended continuously. All these activities have generated Rs. Mn 938,547 million worth of value added to the overall economy in the year 2018.

Chapter 3: THE EXPENDITURE APPROACH

INTRODUCTION

The expenditure approach measures total expenditure on final goods and services produced in the domestic economy plus exports less imports of goods and services. The total is obtained from the sum of final consumption expenditure by households, non-profit institutions serving households (NPISH) and government on goods and services; gross capital formation (capital expenditure on fixed and intangible assets, changes in inventories and acquisitions less disposals of valuables); and net exports of goods and services.

GDP expenditure is a sum of the following expenses;

GDP(E) = C + G + I + (X - M)

C – consumption expenditure

G - government expenditure

I – investment/capital formation

(x-m) – net exports

Consumption Expenditure

Consumption expenditure is the major expenditure component of the economy, Thus, final consumption is broken down into:

- a) Final consumption expenditure of households;
- b) Final consumption expenditure of general government;
- c) Final consumption expenditure of non-profit institutions serving households.

Note that, in the SNA, 'final consumption' by the corporate sector is not admissible.

Final consumption expenditure of households

The final consumption expenditure of households encompasses all domestic costs (by residents and non-residents) for individual needs. Among other things, it includes expenditure on goods and services, the consumption of garden produce, rent for owner-occupied dwellings and imports. Information on consumption expenditure contains according to the Classification of individual consumption by purpose (COICOP).

 Actual Final Household Consumption Expenditure

The value of goods and services that the household consumed or used.

This includes:

a) Household consumption expenditure.

b)Social transfer in kind from general government and nonprofit institutions.

Final consumption expenditure of general government

Final consumption expenditure of general government is classified into two parts;

- 1. Individual Final Consumption Expenditure;
- 2 Collective Final Consumption Expenditure;

Individual services are essentially "private" and are available to certain individuals. Collective services are delivered to the entire community such as security and defense, maintenance of law and order and others. Information on consumption expenditure, according to the Classification of Functions of Government (COFOG).

 Final consumption expenditure by nonprofit institutions serving households (NPISHs)

No information is available to help measure the individual consumption expenditure of non-profit institutions serving households (NPISH)

Balance of payments data on transfers to nongovernment institutions may be an important indicator in countries where foreign aid is a major source of funding for NPISHs.

• Gross Capital Formation

Gross Capital Formation (GCF) includes:

- a) Gross fixed capital formation;
- b) Changes in inventories;
- c) Acquisition less disposals of valuables (such as jewelry and works of art).
- Change in Inventories (CII)

In National Accounts, the difference between the stocks at the end and at the beginning of the accounting period is called "Change in Inventories". Inventories includes:

- · unsold finished products
- · goods for sale with the traders
- unused raw materials (inventories) materials and supplies

work-in-progress (growing crops, maturing trees and livestock, uncompleted structures, uncompleted other fixed assets, partially completed film productions and software) statistical discrepancy between Production GDP and Expenditure GDP.

Net acquisitions of valuables

This item is very small (see Table 1) and is therefore no more than a curiosity for the macroeconomist. Valuables are goods that are bought not to be consumed or used in production.

Exports / Imports

Exports and imports between the domestic economy and the rest of the world are transactions between residents and non-residents of an economic territory, regardless of whether there are corresponding physical movements of goods across borders.

CONSUMPTION EXPENDITURE

Consumption expenditure is the major expenditure component of the economy, which includes Household final consumption expenditure and Government final consumption expenditure. The Final consumption expenditure in real terms recorded the positive growth of 2.9 percent in 2018.

It grew by 9.7 per cent at current prices in 2018 amounting to Rs. 11,055.6 billion compared to 5.8 percent growth recorded in 2017 and 77.0 percent contributes to the GDP. This attributes from Household final consumption expenditure about 67.8 percent.

HOUSEHOLD FINAL CONSUMPTION EXPENDITURE

DATA SOURCES AND VALUE INDICATORS

Household final consumption is usually the largest component of GDP by expenditure. The main sources of data on household consumption are household income & expenditure surveys, imports consumption goods, domestic production of consumption goods. For estimating the consumption of electricity, water and gas, is available with the relevant authorities. The DCS conducts household Consumption and expenditure surveys at 3 year intervals. Expenditure estimates may have to be adjusted to take account of expenditure by residents abroad

expenditure by non-residents in the domestic economy. The balance of payments statistics record these expenditures in the travel account as travel credits (expenditures by non-residents in the domestic economy) and travel debits (expenditures by residents abroad). Commodity flow methods can be used in cases where there are good data on the supply of products.

PRICE INDICATORS

CPI components usually provide appropriate deflators for household consumption. Deflation should be carried out at a COICOP level to ensure that. For expenditures by residents abroad and expenditures by non resident in the domestic economy, we have used as the GDP implicit deflator.




FIGURE 3.1: FINAL EXPENDITURE PATTERN WITH GDP


Table 3.1 shows that the largest component, household final consumption, represented 67.83 % of GDP in 2018. When adding 'individual' government expenditure such as public education and public health care (2.59 % of GDP), the result is households' actual individual consumption (70.42 % of GDP). After adding 'collective' government

consumption (6.54 % of GDP), covering items as administration, justice, defense or the police, the result is total final consumption expenditure, which accounted for 76.96 % of GDP in 2018.

While GNI per capita is often considered as an indicator of a country's living standard, it is actually the sum of all goods and services produced in that country. Actual individual consumption per capita is an alternative indicator better suited to describe the material welfare situation of households in the shares of public financing for the provision of education and health services to individuals.

Food, beverages and tobacco category, the major contributor to the HFCE increased by 8.9 percent in current prices during 2018; share of this category is 32.9 percent of the HFCE as same in the previous year. But Consumer imported goods for the Food and beverages showed a negative growth 7.5

percent during the year compared to the previous year 18.4 percent. Agriculture, Forestry & Fishing activity value added change also significantly increased from 17.2 percent to 9.0 percent. Expenditure on Clothing and footwear increased by 9.0 percent, but this is negative change in 2017.

Expenditure on Furnishings, household equipment and routine household maintenance showed increase by 10.5 percent compared to the previous year negative change 25.7 percent. Consumption on Health increased by 10.9 percent in 2018, It was increased by 1.9 percent in 2017. Imports of Medical and Pharmaceutical Products increased by 9.1 percent where it was 3.6 percent in the year 2017. In the

Production approach value added in human health activity increased from 3.7 percent in 2017 to 11.1 percent in 2018 and education expenses also 0.9 percent slight increase only in 2018 from 8.3 percent in the year 2017 by the government and expenses for the private Education increased by 9.8 percent but Restaurants and hotels expenditure increased by 10.0 percent.

Intermediate Imports of fuel showed high increase by 29.1 percent.

Household expenditure on communication showed a negative 6.9 per cent change in 2018 when compared to 7.2 percent Change in 2017.

GOVERNMENT FINAL CONSUMPTION EXPENDITURE (GFCE)

The share of Final consumption Expenditure of the Government to GDP remained 9.1 percent in 2018. The change of GFCE in 2018 was 15.2 percent and 12.1 percent in 2017. The growth of GFCE was decreased 5.1 percent from 2017 to 2018. The GFCE for the year under review was Rs. 1.310,655 million at current market prices compared to Rs. 1,137,406 million in 2017, showing an increase of 15.2 percent in the year 2018. In constant terms, it was Rs. 600,861 million in 2018 in contrast to Rs. 633,025 million in 2017 indicating a negative growth rate of 5.1 percent for 2018.

In nominal terms the share of collective Final consumption Expenditure of the Government (General public services, Defense, Public order & Safety, Economic Affairs, Environmental protection, Housing and community amenities, Recreation, culture and religion and Social protection) contributed 71.6 percent to GFCE and showed by 20.1 percent change in 2018.

Meanwhile "individual consumption", which is the amount spent by general government and the NPISHs (non-profit institutions serving households) on things that directly benefit households, such as healthcare and education. Households do not pay directly for these services (they pay for them indirectly through taxes), but they benefit from them. Individual Final consumption Expenditure the Government (Health and Education) grew by negative 14.1 percent in 2018, compared with negative 9.5 percent in 2017 which is contributed by 28.4 percent in the recent year. Expenditure on Education and Health sector have increased by 0.9 percent and 8.9 percent during this period compared with the previous year. The share of Government Expenditure on both Education & Health to

GFCE was recorded 14.8 percent, 13.6 percent.

By the table 3.3 In particular, the largest share of the Government final consumption was from the expenditure for General Public Services 21.9 percent in 2018. The expenditure for "Defense" 19.3 percent

"Social protection" 16.1 percent, and "Education" 14.8 percent placed the second, third and fourth respectively, in the reference year. The General Public Services expenditure as a percentage share to total government consumption expenditure in 2018 was 21.9 percent where as it was 11.9 percent in 2017.

Gross capital formation (Investment)

Gross capital formation (GCF) is one of the principal component of final expenditures, typically accounting for around 32 percent of GDP. The share of capital formation (30.4 percent) to GDP in the year 2018 and showed a positive change of 3.8 percent.

GROSS FIXED CAPITAL FORMATION (GFCF)

Table 3.4 shows that the Gross Fixed Capital Formation (GCF) as a percentage of GDP and in current terms showed a 25.6 percent in 2018. The Gross Fixed Capital Formation

The rate of Gross Capital Formation at constant 2010 prices is 36.3 percent and It has recorded a moderate growth rate (4.3 percent) in the year 2018.

(GFCF) which stood at Rs. 3,516,741 million at current price in 2017 has increased to Rs 3,671,712 million in 2018 indicating an increase of 4.4 percent. At constant terms, it recorded a value of Rs 2,440,665 million in 2018 as compared with Rs. 2,452,812 million

in 2017, indicating a negative growth rate of 0.5 percent. The ratio of GFCF to GDP at current prices was 25.6 percent comprising from the private sector and Public sector for the year 2018.

The Gross fixed capital formation by construction increased by 0.5 percent in 2018, 13.0 percent in 2017. At the same time Machinery and equipment and weapons systems grow by 7.0 percent in 2018

compared to 6.9 percent change in previous year and Transport equipment increased by 7.7 percent which is 6.3 percent in 2017. Imports of investment goods increased by 2.0 percent. Information and communication technology (ICT) equipment, Intellectual property increased by 15.8 percent and 9.8 percent respectively. At the sametime cultivated biological resources showed a growth 9.0 percent.

Exports and imports of goods and Services

Exports and imports are key aggregates in the analysis of a country's economic situation. Exchange rates play an important role here. The openness indices for the years 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016,2017 and 2018 are 49.3

percent, 49.6 percent , 50.3 percent 49.6 percent 50.9 percent and 52.9 percent respectively. It measures the extent to which a country is dependent on foreign trade flows with its trading partners.

IMPORTS

The total payment of merchandised imports increased by 12.8 percent in 2018 as against the 13.2 percent in 2017, imports of consumer goods which consist nearly one fifth of the total imports increased by 17.5 percent in 2018 (figure 3.3). The share of imports of consumer goods showed a

decrease from 21.5 percent in 2017 to 22.4 per ecent in 2018. Imports of Intermediate goods which is the largest subsector in Imports increased by 16.3 percent in 2018. This sector has increased by 21.2 percent in 2017 as well. The share of this sector also increased to 56.2 percent with 54.5 percent in

the previous year. Fuel is the largest sector, within Intermediate goods Imports increased by 29.1 percent in 2018. Imports of Chemical Products and Textiles & Textile Articles have increased by 15.5 percent and 12.0 percent respectively in the year 2018. Imports of Fertilizer recorded high increase by 171.8 percent in 2018 compared with previous year decrease 21.1 percent.

Investment goods hold one fifth of total Imports has increased by 2.0 percent in 2018 as against the increase of 2.9 percent recorded in 2017. Transport equipment under Investment goods increased significantly by 5.0 percent in year 2018, Building Materials and Machinery and Equipment increased by 2.1 percent and 1.2 percent respectively.

EXPORTS

Earnings from exports at current terms, which increased by 15.4 per cent in 2017, it is further increased by 11.6 per cent in 2018, to Rs. 1,933,533 million, a 15.6 percent up in industrial and 0.7 percent, little increase in agricultural exports.

By table 3.5, the composition of exports for the year 2017 indicated by 77.9 percent from Industrial exports, 21.7 percent from Agricultural exports, 0.3 from Mineral exports and 0.1 percent from other exports.

Within the total exports, Agricultural exports indicated a significant decrease of 0.7 percent compared with 24.6 percent increase in 2017. Within the Agricultural exports, export income of Tea, Rubber, Coconut Products, Spices, Minor Agricultural Products recorded a negative

changes 0.7 percent, 14.1 percent, 4.8 percent, 5.3 percent and 9.5 percent. While Export earnings from tea, the largest export commodity in Sri Lanka, which accounts for about 12.0 percent of total exports.

Exports of Industrial products increased by 15.6 percent in 2018, mainly led by the petroleum products, Textiles and Garments, Other Industrial and Rubber Products. Gems, Diamonds & Jewellery exports considerable increase by 14.5 percent compared with 1.5 percent decrease of previous year. Textiles and Garments sector contributes high share 57.5 percent to the Industrial exports sector.

Export earnings from Mineral exports increased by 5.8 per cent, to 5,570 Rs. million in 2018.



Table 3.6 shows that India continued major trading country with Sri lanka. United States of America continued to be the largest trade of exports with a share of 25.9 percent in total exports in 2018. Exports from United States of America increased by 12.9 percent from Rs. 443,927

million to Rs. 501,221 million. UK and India are the second and third buyer countries with the shares 8.2 percent and 6.5 percent of total exports for the year 2018. In 2018,

total exports to the UK is recorded little increase by 0.9 percent with Rs. Mn. 159,193. While India's exports significantly decreased to 18.9 percent compared with the increase of previous year increase 31.0 percent. First five largest export countries USA, UK, India, Germany and Italy accounted by 51 percent of total exports. India is the largest trade of imports with a share of 18.8 percent in total imports in 2018. But Imports from India in this year decreased by 1.4 percent from Rs. 685,447 million to Rs.675,872 million.

BALANCE OF TRADE

The balance of trade is the difference between exports and imports. When exports exceed imports this is referred to as a trade surplus, when imports exceed exports this is referred to as a trade deficit.

Balance of trade for Sri Lanka has recorded a deficit for the year 2018. Trade balance can be briefly defined as the difference between export income and expenditure on imports. According to the structures of exports and

imports of Sri Lanka and prices in the world market, expenditure on imports higher than the export income. Accordingly, the trade deficit expanded marginally by 14.1 per cent to -1,673,111 Rs. million in 2018, from the -1,466,133 Rs. Million recorded in 2017. However, as a per cent of GDP, the deficit in the trade balance increased to 11.1 per cent in 2018 from 10.2 per cent in 2017 (Table 3.7).

Chapter 4: INCOME PERSPECTIVE OF THE GDP

INTRODUCTION

The income approach of measuring gross domestic product (GDP) is based on the circular flow of an economy, which displays that total value added in the entire production process of the economy should be equal to the total income generated by production process. Therefore, by summing all the primary incomes which are generated by production process together, an estimate for the total value added of an economy for a given period can be made. Subsequent adjustments must then be made for taxes, less subsidies on products to get GDP at market price.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE INCOME COMPONENTS OF GDP

COMPENSATION OF EMPLOYEES

Compensation of Employees is the total remuneration, in cash or in kind, payable by an enterprise to an employee in return for work done during the accounting period. Compensation of employees is recorded on an accrual basis; that is, it is measured by the value of the remuneration in cash or in kind that an employee become entitled to recover from an employer with respect to work done during the relevant period, whether paid in advance, simultaneously or in arrears of the work itself. No compensation of employees is payable in respect of unpaid work undertaken voluntarily, including the work done by members of a household within an unincorporated enterprise owned by the same household. Compensation of employees does not include any taxes payable by the employer on the wage and salary bill, for example, a payroll tax; such taxes are treated as taxes on production in the same way as taxes on buildings, land or other assets used in production.

Compensation of employees has two main components:

- a. Wages and salaries payable in cash or in kind;
- . Social insurance contributions payable by employers, which include contributions to social security schemes.

OPERATING SURPLUS AND MIXED INCOME

Operating surplus or mixed income is a measure of the surplus accruing from processes of production before deducting any explicit or implicit interest charges, rent or other property incomes payable on the financial assets, land or other natural resources required to carry on the production.

The balancing item described as operating surplus except for unincorporated enterprises owned by households in which the owner(s) or members of the same household may contribute unpaid labour inputs of a similar kind to those that could be provided by paid employees. In the latter case, the balancing item is described as mixed income because it implicitly contains an element of remuneration for work done by the owner, or other members of the household, that cannot be separately identified from the return to the owners as an entrepreneur. In many cases, though, the element of remuneration may dominate the value of mixed income.

The preferred measure of value added is after deducting consumption of fixed capital ,that is, net value added. However, provision is made in the accounts of the SNA for value added, and all subsequent balancing items that depend on value added, to be measured gross or net of consumption of fixed capital. Operating surplus and mixed income may therefore both be expressed as gross or net.

CONSUMPTION OF FIXED CAPITAL (CFC)

Consumption of fixed the capital decline, during the course of the accounting period, in the current value of the stock of fixed assets owned and used by a producer as a result of physical deterioration, normal obsolescence or accidental damage. depreciation is often used in place of consumption of fixed capital, but it is avoided in the SNA because in commercial accounting the term depreciation is often used in the context of writing off historic costs, whereas in the SNA consumption of fixed capital is dependent on the current value of the asset.

Consumption of fixed capital is calculated for all fixed assets owned by producers, but not for valuables. That are acquired precisely because their value, in real terms, is not expected to decline over time. Fixed assets must have been produced as outputs from processes of production as defined in the SNA. Consumption of fixed capital does not, therefore, cover the depletion or degradation of natural assets such as land, minerals or other deposits, coal, oil or natural gas, or contract, leases and licenses.

TAXES ON PRODUCTION AND ON IMPORTS (LESS SUBSIDIES)

Taxes are compulsory, unrequited payments, in cash or in kind, made by institutional units to government units.

They are described as unrequited because the government provides nothing in return to the individual unit, making the payment, although governments may use the funds raised in taxes to provide goods or services to other units, either individually or collectively, or to the community as a whole.

At the highest level of the classification, taxes on production and on imports consist two components;

- 1. Taxes on products (less subsidies)
- 2. Other taxes on production (less subsidies).

Taxes on products consist of taxes on goods and services that become payable as a result of the production, sale, transfer, leasing or delivery of those goods or services, or as a result of their use for own consumption or own capital formation.

Other taxes on production consist mainly of taxes on the ownership of land, buildings or other assets used in production or in the labour employed, or compensation of employees paid. Whatever the valuation of output used, other taxes on production are always recorded as a charge on the value added in the generation of income.

At current prices, Compensation of Employees (CoE) is estimated at Rs. 4,287,840 million for the year 2018. It has increased by 15.3 percent compared to the recorded Rs. 3,717,734 million CoE in the year 2017. At constant prices, Rs. 2,651,309 million CoE recorded for the year 2018 and it grew by 4.8 percent compared to the recorded Rs. 2,528,769 million CoE in the year 2017.

Gross Operating Surplus recorded at Rs. 8,835,822 million in 2018 compared to Rs. 8,330,583 million in 2017. The GOS increased by 6.1 percent in nominal terms and

estimated GOS at Constant prices for the years 2017 and 2018 were Rs. 5,895,910 and Rs. 6,087,543 million, respectively. Hence GOS in 2018 grew by 3.3 percent in real terms.


Mixed income totally generates through Household sector and Estimated for the year 2018 as Rs. 906,021 million and It was 11.5 percent more than the Rs. 812,537 million of MI, recorded in 2017. Meanwhile MI in 2018 grew by 0.6 percent. Further, other taxes less subsidies on production increased by 0.7 percent in 2018 while accounting for a 0.6 percent growth in real terms.
